A LETTER FROM THE CHAIR



The past year has been a whirlwind of activity for the Board of Directors of the Loudoun Literacy Council as we came together with old and new staff to strengthen the foundation of this 38-year-old organization and set the stage for its future success. While we faced a few challenges along the way, I'm proud to say that are significantly stronger – in terms of both staff capacity and financial resources – and well-positioned to continue delivering high-quality literacy programs for economically disadvantaged children and adults here in Loudoun County.

During this past year, our dedicated crew of Board members functioned as a working board, which had the benefit of giving us useful insights into the needs of the organization and the populations we serve. As a result, we have made progress in several critical areas. Here are some of the highlights from our perspective.

First and foremost, we brought on a few new staff members, including Nikki Daruwala as executive director. In the past year, Nikki proved herself ready and able to take the lead in refining our literacy programs, expanding and strengthening our partnerships in the community, ensuring the financial health of the organization, and supporting the board in its governance of the organization. In the same way that adult and family literacy programs complement each other, the Loudoun Literacy Council benefited from blending the fresh ideas of new staff with the experience and wisdom of existing staff.

We've also had success in tackling the challenge of expanding and diversifying our funding base. We are grateful to the many people and organizations that have been supporting the work of the Loudoun Literacy Council – some for more than 20 years and some just starting in the past year. And we hope you've had a good time testing your spelling skills and trivia knowledge at our adult spelling bees!

Finally, we have a new strategic plan for the Loudoun Literacy Council that articulates our core values and reaffirms our commitment to our vision that all those who live and work in our county will have the literacy skills required to participate and thrive in our community. In the past year, we expanded our partnerships with the many nonprofit, public, and private organizations that share in this vision – and we will continue to collaborate with them to work toward it.

Thank you to everyone who made it possible for us to share the gift of literacy! We hope you will join us in making the coming year an even better one.

WHO WE ARE

Loudoun Literacy Council has been providing literacy services in Loudoun County since 1980. Our programs have evolved over time from English tutoring services for recently arrived refugees to extensive literacy enrichment opportunities for adults and children through both our Adult and Family Literacy Programs.

Our Adult Literacy Program provides small group classes and individual tutoring for adults seeking assistance in basic literacy, English for speakers of other languages, and GED preparation. In the last decade, Loudoun Literacy Council has been systematically enhancing our core programs for adults – for example, by offering Job Site Literacy. In Spring 2018, we incorporated elements of financial literacy into our classroom curriculum.

Since 1998, our Family Literacy Program has provided the federally mandated, but unfunded literacy, enrichment

component to the Head Start program in Loudoun County Public Schools (LCPS), which includes reading in the classrooms, book distribution, and family literacy events for all members of the families served. In 2017, this program was expanded to include children in LCPS's Starting Toward Excellence in Preschool (STEP) program. Our Sweet Dreams Program models reading aloud for families and provides literacy activities for families residing in the local homeless shelters while the Baby Book Bundles provides literacy tips and baby books to at-risk expectant and new parents.

We train and utilize a network of more than 150 volunteers to bring our programs to life in the communities that make up Loudoun County. Furthermore, we incorporate a community partnership model to enhance and deliver our services.


TIMELINE OF MILESTONES



ADULT LITERACY

Classroom Instruction: We offer English for Speakers of Other Languages (ESOL) classes in the spring, summer, and fall. Classes range from beginner to advanced level and focus on life skills. All classes are taught by trained volunteers.

275 STUDENTS ENROLLED IN ONE OF THE 33 CLASSES AT 11 SITES. 100% SHORT-TERM GOAL ATTAINMENT RATE.

Individual Tutoring: One-on-one tutoring is available year-round to students who need help in a specific area or need a personalized curriculum and instructional pace.

20 STUDENTS SPENT 400 INSTRUCTIONAL HOURS TOWARDS THE ATTAINMENT OF AN INDIVIDUAL GOAL. 95% Short-term goal attainment rate.

Jobsite Literacy Program: We offer services to local companies with employees who want to improve their English. We create and deliver a curriculum tailored to the business' needs and conduct all classes at the jobsite.

SERVED **5 EMPLOYERS** AND PROVIDED 204 INSTRUCTIONAL HOURS TO **29 STUDENTS**.

Financial Literacy: In 2018, we partnered with SkillSource to deliver basic financial literacy, including budgeting, basic banking, and savings.

General Educational Development Instruction: We provide individualized instruction to help residents working toward the completion of the GED program.

Citizenship Test Preparation: Individualized instruction to help residents prepare for the U.S. Citizenship Naturalization Test.

FAMILY LITERACY

Head Start Literacy Program: We partner with Loudoun County Public Schools to provide a literacy component to children and their families. We read each week, host Family Literacy Nights, and provide books for a home library for each student.

Sweet Dreams Program: Each week, we read and conduct literacy activities with children residing at the Volunteers of America Homeless Shelter.

48 HOURS OF READING. 350 BOOKS DISTRIBUTED.

Book Builder Program: We partner with local organizations, churches, schools, and businesses to collect donated books for children in our community. These books are distributed to partner organizations who also work directly with children in our community.

9,055 BOOKS DISTRIBUTED. 16 COMMUNITY PARTNER ORGANIZATIONS RECEIVED BOOKS.

Starting Towards Excellence in Preschool Literacy Program:

New this year, our partnership with the STEP Program allows us to reach more than 300 low-income preschoolers each year with new books and family literacy events.
